Program Notes

ENCHANTED by Matthew Kaminski

Enchanted takes place in a fairytale like setting, and is more of a journey rather than a moral story. On this journey, one experiences magical thoughts and visions, hence the name.

AUBADE by Gary Noland

The *Aubade* is the fifth in a set of six piano pieces I composed as a divertissement from my involvement in the composition of a 75-hour text piece at the time.

VARIATIONS ON NOTTURNO from Mikrokosmos 4 by Béla Bartók by Linda Woody

Hungarian composer Bela Bartok (1881-1945) wrote Mikrokosmos, a set of 153 progressive piano pieces in six volumes between 1926 and 1939. *Notturno*, a short, haunting melody in E minor written over an eighth note pattern in 6/8 time, is the first piece in book 4. The set of variations by Linda Woody were originally written as a college composition assignment and first performed by a close friend at her senior recital. In the first variation, the meter is "squared up" and the melody is played in thirds. The second variation is in 12/8, with the accompanying eighth note pattern changing between the treble and bass and ends with a Picardy third. Variation 3 makes use of the 16th note motive from the theme. The final variation is a bit silly, written in E major with a Classical-sounding Alberti bass.

AUTUMN WINDS by Lisa Ann Marsh

Autumn Winds is the last of four pieces in Seasons and contains textures and rhythms that reflect the torrential changes autumn brings.

PICNIC ANTS by Jan Mittelstaedt

This a musical picture of a picnic where ants are uninvited guests.

AEOLIAN ISLE (Duet) by Liz Nedela

Portrays a mystical, exotic island. Duet takes turns with different melodies. From a collection of modal duets that illustrate the fifth note of each mode, using it above and below the starting note.

WALTZ by Zach Davis

This composition is all about contrasts. As this short piece speeds by, listen for the distinct melody passed between the hands, dissonant jabs of harmony, and the surprise ending.

ALLEGRO IN B MAJOR by Gary Noland

I composed the *Allegro in B Major* as a counterpoint assignment when I was a sophomore in college almost forty years ago. I made a few revisions on the piece some fifteen years ago. I composed two other movements shortly after writing the first one, both of which sit in a drawer (or box) somewhere awaiting further revisions.

LIKE SPIDERS ACROSS THE STARS by Nick Yandell

This piece is a piano arrangement of a work I originally wrote for mandolin and ukulele duet. The title is a line from Jack Kerouac's *On the Road*, but gained a life of its own when I attempted to audiate the actual visual image contained within the simile. Just imagine some spiders crawling around in the cosmos...

FUGUE THEME FOR A NIGHT by Timothy O'Brien

This song started out as a study on the Fugue written for the organ. I wanted it to seem to be resolving around the minor scale, and how one accomplishes traversing across soundscapes with dark melodious features. This song is meant to mimic an organ church prelude and should have a light and airy character, yet a dark ominous feel.

WALKING IN MAN GONG by Liz Nedela

Blues Minor/Man Gong Pentatonic scale. Changing rhythms with slightly jazz influence in rhythm patterns and chordal structure; hand-crossings, wide range on keyboard. Portrays a "cool" stroll with a beat.

MINI SCHERZANDO by Greg A Steinke

Mini Scherzando is an excerpt from an earlier and longer work, *Tomorrow On Yesterday* for Harp, that I adapted for keyboard to be played ideally on harpsichord but also on piano.

SONATINA FOR YOUTH (Feeling Awesome) by Jan Mittelstaedt Sonatina is written in sonata allegro form. Theme 1 expresses the exuberance of youth, especially teens, while theme 2 is more lyrical and reflective. The other two movements, which are not being performed, are entitled Stressed Out and Right On.

CREATIVE MIND (Duet) by Paul Safar

I wrote this piece back in 1996. It is dedicated to my father, Peter Safar, who had a very creative mind indeed. He was a fine amateur pianist and he and I did play through the piece a few times. But my most striking memory was playing it with my piano teachers at my father's memorial service in 2003.

CLOUD HANDS by Mike Hsu

Sometime in the late 90's, I came up with the first 8 measures. It took me 16 years to finally write the rest of it. I named it *Cloud Hands* because the player's hands float over one another, as in the T'ai Chi movement with the same name.

BOSSACAGLIA by Paul Safar

This piece was inspired after hearing a Purcell ground bass piece performed as a beautiful, simple solo encore after a piano concerto at the Eugene Symphony. I was also getting interested in bossa nova at the time through a piano student so I thought the two elements might make a nice combination. This piece was written for and is dedicated to my dear adult student (76 years young), Judy Tanner.

WINTER STARLIGHT by David S. Bernstein

Winter Starlight is a short little piano work that is very romantic in style in the sense that it is dominated by melody throughout. The piece was originally written for a music theory colleague of mine who played through it frequently in class to demonstrate the implied harmonies that exist. It was designed for a college freshman class for analysis. The piece contains no accidentals outside the key of D Major and is barely over one minute in length.

STARFISH by Jan Mittelstaedt

Starfish is a composition created by recycling. It contains two themes that I used in my composition for flute and piano, *Links*, which was performed at a Cascadia Composers concert in 2012. These themes were originally part of a flute choir piece, *Exiles from Acadia*, performed in 1993 at my MM degree recital. I wrote *Starfish* for Melaudie Palazo.

WINTER LIGHT by Lisa Ann Marsh

Winter Light is the first piece in *Seasons*, composed in 2013. It depicts the peace and quiet of winter.

ALL THE BEAUTIFUL COLORS OF MY BELLY BUTTON LINT

In 2015, my piano students and I co-wrote a two-hour-long puppet show called "The Adventures of Sir Knight, The Princess and The Pig: A Fairy Tale of Five Elements", which we performed with a seamless live piano soundtrack in Portland, Oregon in June 2015. The plot revolves around the bumbling but kind-hearted Sir Knight, who reluctantly joins the brave Princess and a talking Pig on a grand adventure to rescue Arfur the Dog, who has been kidnapped by dragons.

One of the host of memorable characters that the group meets along the way is The Flying Squirrel, an overly talkative and energetic fellow who enjoys singing annoying songs as they travel together.

When my students gathered to read through the final script, they were already familiar with most of the action since they all had helped craft the story and much of the dialogue. However, there was a part that they hadn't heard, a bit that I had added at the last minute to fill in a missing transition. When we got to this part in the full-cast read-through, complete bedlam broke out:

<u>Flying Squirrel:</u> Are we there yet? Man, this anticipation is killing me! I wanna see DRAGONS!!! Hey, anybody for another round of "99 Bottles of Beer on the Wall"?

<u>Princess</u>: No thank you, Flying Squirrel, I think we could all use some quiet time.

<u>Flying Squirrel:</u> Oh wait! I know what we could sing! This is a great one. I made it up myself! I'll sing it a few times so you can learn it, and then we'll all sing it together. It has 143 verses and it's called "All the Beautiful Colors of My Belly Button Lint"!

Princess & Pig & Sir Knight: NO THANK YOU!

Flying Squirrel: Sheesh! Everybody's a critic! Oh well, your loss!

My students all fell over and laughed so hard that they couldn't breathe for a long time, and kept repeating the song title over and over while clutching their stomachs and screeching with glee. Then they all demanded to know how the song went, so I had to write it. They all helped me invent enough specialty colors to fill up 143 verses.

Jan Mittelstaedt holds a BS in education from Bucknell University, a BA in music from Marylhurst University and a MM in composition from The University of Portland. Her composition teacher at The U of Portland, Dr. Walter Saul, continues to be her mentor. President of Cascadia Composers, NACUSA, Jan is published by Schaum Publications, and Boston Music (Music Sales International). Two of her student piano pieces have been included in National Federation of Music Clubs Junior Festival bulletins (NFMC)). She was selected to participate in the 1993 Ernest Bloch Composers Symposium, was Oregon Music Teachers Association (OMTA) Composer of the Year in 1994, and has received many ASCAP Plus awards. Her biography is included in Who's Who in America and Who's Who in American Women. Nationally Certified by Music Teachers National Association, Jan serves as a member of the OMTA syllabus adjudicating staff, presents workshops and programs on teaching composition to teachers and students, and adjudicates student compositions. In 2013, she received Portland District's Honorary Lifetime membership (OMTA).

Liz Nedela

Liz Nedela BA, MEd, MM, NCTM, teaches piano and composition in Vancouver WA. She strives to write music that is accessible to musicians and audiences of varied preferences -- educational, avant garde, church music, instrumental, vocal -- solo music, ensemble, orchestral, choral, using a wide variety of styles of music. She is fond of experimental scales, modes and pentatonic; ethnic music; counterpoint; and the continued quest for melody in any style of music. As a result, many commissions have ensued from Chapters of MTNA, two art galleries, church music, and special music by select musicians for concerts. As the 2014 WSMTA Commissioned Composer of the Year, a piano duet resulted from an in-depth study of pentatonic scales, ranging from ancient to present day jazz influence.

Timothy Arliss O'Brien's composition life started at the age of 5, grew through his musical studies at a Harding charter prep high school in Oklahoma, matured from his time as a music major at Oklahoma Wesleyan University, and is now flourishing in the city of Portland, Oregon. Many of his early works were for the instruments he plays: trumpet and piano, but in the past years, his catalogue of compositions has expanded to include everything from operas, sacred works and choral works, to brass quintets, percussion duets, and sonatas that include the toy piano and theremin.

Paul Safar is a versatile composer/performer and private piano instructor living and working in Eugene, Oregon. Having received his B.Mus from the College-Conservatory of Music in Cincinnati, Ohio, Paul draws upon his classical music training while often incorporating stylistic elements from jazz and rock. He works regularly with the soprano Nancy Wood and thrives on collaborative projects. In addition to numerous chamber music and vocal works, Paul has written one orchestral piece, a *Concerto for Electric Guitar*. Paul was the OMTA composer of the year for 2013-14.

Greg A Steinke

Dr. Greg A Steinke is retired, former Joseph Naumes Endowed Chair of Music/Art and Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Marylhurst University, Marylhurst, Oregon; Associate Director, Ernest Bloch Music Festival ('93–97) and Director, Composers Symposium ('90–97) (Newport, OR); served as the National Chairman of the Society of Composers, Inc. (1988–97). Composer of chamber and symphonic music and author with published/recorded works and performances across the U. S. and internationally; speaker on interdisciplinary arts, and oboist specializing in contemporary music. Dr. Steinke is the current national president of NACUSA and also serves on the NACUSA Cascadia Chapter Board.

Linda Woody

Linda Woody lives in West Linn, OR and is a music graduate of Marylhurst University (BA Music, BM Composition 2013). She studied music composition with Dr. Bob Priest and Dr. John Paul. She enjoys writing for a variety of ensembles including handbell choir, choral groups, piano trio, string trio, middle school band and mixed instrumental groups. Her works have been performed by members of the Oregon Chamber Players, Big Horn Brass, Delphinium String Quartet, the Classical Beauties piano trio, Free Marz String Trio, Lake Carillon and Vesper Bells handbell choirs, the Marylhurst Chorale and by members of Third Angle and the Oregon and Vancouver Symphonies.
