Program Notes

PACIFIC PASTORAL for Piano Duet by Matthew Kaminski Inspired by a camping trip in the North Cascades, Matthew's composition, Pacific Pastoral, was originally written for the Southridge High School Wind Ensemble. To be able to perform this without the expense of a wind ensemble, Matthew created a piano duet version of this piece that carries many motifs including rain, mountain views, and daydreamy thoughts of hiking again. It is amazing what beauty nature can hold for us, and the never ending adventures and sights that beckon us to go deeper and develop a love for travel and nature.

SUITE EL BATEY: La Criolitta; El Dulcero by Yalil Guerra La Criollita and El Dulcero, are both part of Suite El Batey, Guerra's first piano composition. Each one of the highly pianistic movements that delineate the suite offers a challenge to the interpreter, highly influenced by the early Cuban Contradanzas and Habaneras rhythms. Both pieces features a traditional harmonic language, while El Dulcero shines for its 5/4 time signature, a non traditional approach on how the Cuban Music is written and performed. In both compositions can be heard elements of the composers Afro-Cuban rhythmic roots, demanding a very precise and sharp rhythmic performance.

SABER TOOTH DANCE by Jan Mittelstaedt

I imagine a spirited dance followed by swaying which then goes back to the first mood.

11-8-16 (Just Shy of Midnight) by Paul Safar

At around 11:30 pm on that particularly important Tuesday, I knew I needed to either go outside and take a walk to clear my head or sit down at the piano. I decided to do the latter and this short piece is what came out.

HOPE IS THE THING WITH FEATHERS by Matthew Neil Andrews

Hope is the thing with feathers That perches in the soul, And sings the tune without the words, And never stops at all,

And sweetest in the gale is heard; And sore must be the storm That could abash the little bird That kept so many warm.

I've heard it in the chillest land, And on the strangest sea; Yet, never, in extremity, It asked a crumb of me.

Because I was something of a melancholy weirdo child, I was drawn to fellow melancholy weirdo Emily Dickinson, both for her exquisite poetry and her fascinating character. In this song I pay homage to two other eccentrics: the Rosicrucian eremite Erik Satie and the woodsy polymath Lou Harrison. Much gratitude to my teacher, the incomparable Crazy Jane composer Bonnie Miksch.

PRELUDES: 1 and 7 by John De Runtz

My Prelude No.1 in B-flat minor was written in 1976. It was presumptuously dedicated to the `Poet of the Piano,' Frederic Francois Chopin', whose music has always been an inspiration to me. Strangely enough, we share a common cultural heritage, we both had a Polish mother and a French father. Spooky!

My Prelude No. 7 in D minor was written in 2009. It is a short composition of only 24 measures, but it encompasses a wide dynamic range with a simple driving eighth note left hand accompaniment.

CAPRICE by Elizabeth Dyson

When I wrote "Caprice" for violin, I was thinking about someone having fun on the violin, with maybe a half-remembered folk song at the back of their mind.

CHINESE POLKA by Jan Mittelstaedt

I named this piece *Chinese Polka* because I thought the A section sounded like a polka and the open fifths in the B section made me think of Asian music. My long time friend from Junior High, Emily Stewart, a fine artist, created the cover for the duet.

NORTHERN LULLABY by Linda Woody

Northern Lullaby, one of four short pieces from the composer's Compass Suite, was originally written for woodwind quartet and later adapted for flute and piano. The piece features a gently rocking rhythm in 5/4 meter and the middle section has a fanciful flute solo, perhaps illustrating the baby's — or the babysitter's dream.

SNOWBOUND by Jan Mittelstaedt

The first part of this solo is Romantic in style. However, the middle part contains changing meters and some dissonance, and there is a partial tone row in measure 37 which depicts snow falling. To me, the musical picture painted is a quiet scene in a log cabin where people are stranded by the snow with mounting tension and frustration, and a return to calm as the snow subsides.

SKETCH IN FOUR PARTS by Ted Clifford

There is something about this piece that makes me think of traipsing around to unusual places. I feel like this piece could represent a journey, going away to somewhere exotic, and then coming back again, and finding oneself changed in the process.

THE BELLS ARE RICH AND STRANGE by Linda Woody This piece for flute and cello was inspired by Full Fathom Five, from *Ariel's Song* in William Shakespeare's play, *The Tempest*, where Ariel is ordered by Prospero to lead the shipwrecked Ferdinand to him. Ferdinand mistakenly thinks his father has drowned. This one-minute work acknowledges Ferdinand's sadness and grief at the beginning with a brief minor-key melody and both instruments in their lower registers, but also shows the transformation and enduring qualities of a "sea change" into something "rich and strange" a few bars in. Numerous permutations of an English church bell change-ring pattern begin in the cello part and are handed off to the flute. These patterns are passed back and forth throughout the piece. The uneasy, contrasting melody which is also shared between the parts is based (mostly) on an octatonic scale. The ³/₄ meter represents the rocking motion of the sea. The piece ends with the deep tolling "bell" of the low C in the cello.

So there I was, dressed as a cowgirl: pigtails, the checkered shirt, a stalk of wheat, the whole deal. I had to look the part for a show: I was performing the narrator's part in a composition based on e e cumming's poem "Buffalo Bill's Defunct." It was great fun, but I had a few other things on my mind at the time; before the performance, I was having a hurried production meeting in a university cafeteria with two fellow composers, Paul and Dan, to nail down some details concerning an upcoming concert. We likely made a funny scene to observe, but, absorbed in the meeting, I had already forgotten about my Western getup.

Paul and Dan had already eaten but I had been in rehearsals all day and was starving. I was not succeeding at trying to multi-task the meeting and a chicken-and-gravy dinner. Every time I got the fork halfway to my mouth, I'd have to put it down to write something down or wave my hands, as I generally do when making a point. Finally, famished, I said, "OK! Stop talking for a minute! I can't eat and think at the same time."

"Eat, eat!" said my friend Paul. "Nobody likes a skinny cowgirl."

Composer Biographies

Matthew Neil Andrews

Matthew Andrews is terrible pianist, a passable percussionist, and a proud student of gamelan expert Mindy Johnston and Crazy Jane composer Bonnie Miksch. He holds a B.A. in Music Composition from Vanguard University, where he studied with Robert T. Reno, and currently works as Arts & Culture Editor for the PSU Vanguard. He does not, however, consider himself an avant-garde composer.

Ted Clifford

Ted Clifford has over 20 years of experience as a performer and composer. Growing up in St. Cloud, Minnesota, he attended college there and studied with Alvaro Bertand and Tom Allen. After travels in Europe and Central Asia, Ted continued to study jazz performance, and composition, under Art Lande, David Friesen, and Tomas Svoboda. A third stream of eclecticism has involved performance of arrangements of Frank Zappa. Ted has released an album of jazz originals (Azir), and his compositions and arrangements have been performed as far as Germany and Cuba, He is a board member with Cascadia Composers.

John De Runtz

In 2011, John DeRuntz had the unique experience of being invited to perform his original works at the prestigious Van Cliburn Sixth International Piano Competition for Outstanding Amateurs. And, if that weren't enough, Van shook John's hand and told him that he had written some wonderful music.

John began playing the piano when he was about seven years old. He taught himself to play, and then to compose piano, guitar and vocal music. John has had a varied musical life as a classical pianist, while also playing in piano bars, performing in folk music bands and being a guitar accompanist for flamenco dancers. He has also been a member of symphonic choirs and the chorus of an opera company, and, by chance, became a classical radio personality in Colorado. He has recorded four CD albums and some of his music has had air time on our own Portland radio station, All Classical 89.9 KQAC FM as well as 88.7 KCME FM in Colorado Springs, Colorado. David Stabler, the music critic for the Oregonian, has written of John's music as being, `in a lyrical style suggestive of Chopin.' Another music critic, Olin Chism, of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, wrote, `He is unabashedly old-fashioned, composing in a sort of neo-Chopin style that was kind of charming. A couple of his melodies lingered in memory.'

What these reviewers don't know is that John shares the same European heritage as Chopin, they both had a French father and a Polish mother. Kind of spooky!

Elizabeth Dyson

Elizabeth Blachly-Dyson enjoys writing for young musicians and has written works performed by the BRAVO Youth Orchestra and the Pacific Crest Youth Sinfonietta. She teaches music theory at the Music and Arts Academy in Camas, Washington and she has adjudicated Composition Celebrations for the Oregon Music Teachers association.

Yalil Guerra

Yalil Guerra was born in Havana, Cuba, April 27th, 1973. He is the son of the famous Cuban vocal duo Rosell y Cary. Guerra obtained a Bachelor Degree in classical Guitar at the *Escuela Nacional de Música* in Havana in 1991. At the age of 16, he won the International Competition and Festival of Classical Guitar Award in Krakow, Poland, as well as receiving the Special Prize (1990), thus becoming the youngest Cuban awarded a prize in an international contest. Additionally, in 1991 he won a full scholarship and studied at the *Instituto Superior de Música*, Cuba. In 1993 he moved to Spain and obtained a Master's Degree in Classical Guitar at the *Conservatorio Superior de Música de Madrid*. Since 2008, Guerra has been studying composition privately with Aurelio de la Vega. In 2015 Guerra obtained a Master's Degree in Film Scoring at the Shepherd University, Los Angeles,. His art music includes compositions for orchestra, chamber ensembles and soloists, the majority of them having been premiered in the Americas and in Europe. He works for Univision Networks, and is part of the Music Faculty Department

at Shepherd University and College of the Canyons; he is also President of NACUSA LA Chapter.

Matthew Kaminski

Matthew Kaminski is a freshman at Southridge High School. He studies piano with Ruth Sadilek and composition with Michael Johanson. He has also studied composition with Daniel Brugh.
